Letter from the chair of the Builders By Heather B. Reichenbach

We are in a season of transitions. While transitions can sometimes be unsettling, I love all the new energy it brings! Here at home, our tulips are pushing up through the dirt. The days are growing longer. The school year is coming to an end. Health protocols and recommendations have adjusted to reflect current COVID-19 risks. Communities are learning how to be together again. The weather is progressively warmer, and even slipping back to cold signals transition.

The neat thing about transitions is that while they may mark the end of something (which could be unsettling), they also simultaneously happen at the beginning of something new (yay!). Transitions are the space in between what was and what is to become.

While much is shifting in the world around us, Camp Friedenswald also stands witness to exciting transitions:

- New Camps: Grand Camp, Just Camp, Restoration Retreat
- Controlled burning
- New signs
- · Improved insulation
- Solar initiative
- Black locust tree playground
- Summer staff search

Some transitions can be easily measured, but some transitions (or pieces of the transition) can also be invisible to the naked eye. They can be invisible because the changes happen on a scale that makes them hard to notice, like Lake Shavehead slowly creeping into warmer temperatures. Or they can be invisible because the initial transition happens internally or behind the scenes without any outward sign, like the impact of a campfire story on an impressionable fourth grader during a week of summer camp. Transitions also provide space to re-imagine and grant permission to change what was. It seems safe to say that we are formed by and live within transitions. Transitions and periods of transitions surround us whether or not we are immediately aware of them.

And although it may appear that transitions just happen, they don't. It takes some form of a catalyst for a transition to begin, creating a shift or change. Catalysts are imperative for transitions to occur. For tulips to grow, the sun needs to warm the soil. For new Camp weeks to be offered, staff and constituent dreaming must emerge and conversations take shape. For the peaceful woods to produce renewed space for gathering and being together, it must actively engage in the changes of the season.

For every transition at Friedenswald, there are catalysts. In playground-building, in insulation installation, in summer staff on-boarding, in food preparation, in camp registration, in controlled burning, in visual and verbal storytelling, in both project and maintenance funding, in stewardship planning... all these transitions (and many, many more!) begin from one or more catalysts. Camp is fortunate; there are many catalysts at work here: staff, volunteers, churches, campers, Builders, board, the Divine.

Reflections from Jane Litwiller, program director

There are many things I'm looking forward to about Summer 2022 at Camp Friedenswald. One goal that comes to mind includes developing and furthering relationships with all of you who have a special connection to Camp. Another opportunity I'm eager for is "simply" learning about all of the intricacies that go into conducting programming in this place. Another is digging more deeply into the larger body of work and research that studies the values, benefits, strategies, practices, pedagogy, etc., that undergird and help to inform the work of Camps in general and the work we do here at Camp Friedenswald in particular. And, of course, literally digging into this place and learning more about its ecosystems, soils, waters, plants, vertebrates, and invertebrates is also towards the top of my list. I also believe that asking questions is fundamental to developing relationships, promoting interest, and engaging the world. And, I believe that observing Creation is essential if we are to understand the Creator. What are some questions you want to explore this summer at Camp? What are some examples you notice of God at work? How do these questions foster your relationship with our Creator?

Whatever your questions may be this summer, I look forward to transformational time together in the presence of God. Camp is committed to being a safe and inclusive space for these explorations to occur no matter what identities our campers, guests, and staff bring with them. 2021 by the numbers

In 2021, Camp demonstrated the ability to be flexible and creative in order to safely welcome more guests and campers back to the peaceful woods. While navigating COVID precautions and an ever-changing world, we continued to work on goals in our Resilience and Sustainability Plan. Here is a glimpse of some of what happened in 2021, by the numbers.

92,511 Kilowatt hours

92,511 kWh solar energy produced on-site and by Camp's community solar panels (39% of Camp's electric usage) reducing our CO2 equivalent emissions by 65.6 metric tons*

4+1 Upgraded

4 appliances and I leaf blower upgraded to electric (electricity is a cleaner energy source for Camp currently AND has the potential to be much cleaner in the future) 483

Hours

483 hours spent by staff and volunteers working on ecological restoration and invasive species removal (115 acres, or 36%, of Camp's natural areas stewarded) 14,217

Square feet

14,217 square feet of insulation added to 7 buildings


Who is a Builder?
