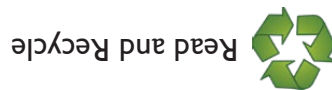

Summer theme 2024: Animal Kin-dom

As we continue to immerse ourselves in learning more about God through understanding God's good creation this summer at Camp, we'll be exploring our theme, "Animal Kin-dom," and reflecting on our interconnectedness with the animals that live in this place. We'll be learning about interdependence within ecosystems and considering how God's vision of shalom is all-encompassing, calling us to be in right-relationship with all of creation. We'll be remembering that all creatures are made by God, in God's image, and called "good."

I confess, it's much easier for me to see the face of God in a furry little fox pup than it is in the face of a deer tick. Say whaaat?! Yes. How is God calling me to live in right-relationship with the deer ticks this year? How do I balance the idea of shalom and my own personal well being as an animal on this planet that also has specific needs (to maintain my health and my family's health by not getting tick-borne illnesses)?

Ticks aren't innately bad. Conversely, God created them good, pathogen-free at birth, and they do play a role in the ecosystems they inhabit. This can include being a part of the food web in that smaller birds, reptiles, mammals, and other animals may eat them. Additionally, as a disease vector, they can have a limiting impact on deer populations. They are living their lives doing what God created them to do and they are so successful at it!

So, how do I restore shalom with the ticks? As with most things in life, I don't claim to have solid answers but it drives me to ask more questions and learn much in the process. Generally what appears to be the problem on the surface can have more complex causes and solutions if one digs a little deeper. I've come to conclude that the abundance of ticks is a symptom of a system out of balance with many potential causes.

Climate change is a major underlying factor. Having warmer winters more frequently with higher overall humidity is causing their range and the populations of ticks to increase unchecked. Loss of biodiversity, habitat fragmentation, and plentiful acorn crops also compound the problem. Take away robust forest ecosystems that can support the predators to keep the white-footed mouse (this is where ticks contract the disease causing pathogens) population in check, combined with the abundant food supply in the acorns, and it's a recipe for success on the part of the ticks.

Going forward, maybe the ticks can be yet another wake up call to action and help me/us strengthen the resolve to commit to acting in more sustainable ways in our home places. This is but one example. I encourage you to consider an animal relevant to you in your place and to contemplate the invitation from this messenger as a being created in the image of God. I look forward to hearing about how your experience shifts your perspective!

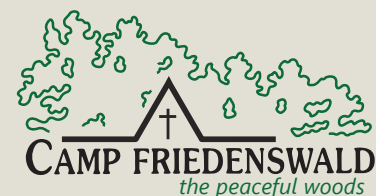

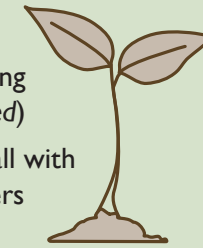


Strategic Plan - Progress report and steps taken in 2023

Alongside running programs and serving guests in 2023, we also took steps towards our strategic goals, trusting they will lead us more deeply into our mission. Steps we took are highlighted below. You can find the complete report online at <https://friedenswald.org/strategic-plan-2023-25/>.

PLACE

- Completed planting of 9,000 trees on north property
- 800+ hours committed to land stewardship
- Received Cass County Conservation District award for recycling, waste management, and sustainable purchasing (Amy Huser and Jonathan Fridley, pictured)
- 29,000+ meals served in the dining hall with some foods coming from local suppliers (like blueberries and squash!)



JUSTICE

- 500+ people participated in an indigenous history and story hike
- \$10,408 given in financial scholarships (the highest \$ in at least a decade)
- Joined Supportive Communities Network and adopted a welcome and inclusion statement (Karl Shelly and Jenna Liechty Martin pictured below)
- Began a journey of repair with Brethren Mennonite Council for LGBT Interests, responding to past harms in a spirit of repentance and hope



FORMATION

- 607 campers attended a summer camp! We served more youth campers (334 people) than we had since 2014 and the most family campers (273 people) in over 20 years!
- Summer theme *Water Ways* highlighted connections between our Christian faith and the watersheds we inhabit
- 1800+ people served through our school-based outdoor education program



RESILIENCE

- 780 volunteer days given
 - Created a master plan for renovating and rebuilding facilities, including lodges and staff housing
 - Switched to low/non-toxic all-purpose cleaners
 - Received generous financial support from individuals and congregations, helping to exceed funding goal in 2023
- 2023 summer staff, pictured

ESTATE GIFTS

In 2023 Camp Friedenswald was the recipient of several generous estate gifts. We remember the lives of these individuals and are grateful for their foresight and generous spirits that are reflected in their final gifts to Camp Friedenswald. These gifts will support upcoming capital needs that will help sustain Camp's mission into the future.

Tom & Jeannette Bechtel (Goshen, Indiana) credited Camp Friedenswald for bringing them together in the summer of 1959 when they both served on summer staff. They were lifelong supporters of Camp. Tom helped construct the original chapel building and Jeannette served on the board in the late 1980s.

Robert "Bob" & Miriam Liechty (Berne, Indiana) were active Builders and volunteers throughout their lives, with Bob sharing his skills in plumbing and heating in many projects. Together they fostered a love of Friedenswald in many of their children and then grandchildren.

Theodore "Ted" & Josephine "Jo" Sommer (Pekin, Illinois) were faithful Builders throughout their lives. Ted's father, O.J. Sommer, was among the group of people who were involved in the selection and purchase of the original 40-acres that was Camp Friedenswald. They shared a deep commitment and care for Camp that was reflected through their family's involvement over the years and in the generous support they provided throughout their lives.
